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# St Andrew's Primary School Primary PE & Sport Premium Action Plan 2023 – 2024





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### Department for Education Vision for the Primary PE and Sport Premium:

ALL pupils leaving primary school physically literate and with the knowledge, skills and motivation necessary to equip them for a healthy, active lifestyle and lifelong participation in physical activity and sport.

To achieve self-sustaining improvement in the quality of PE and sport in primary schools. It is important to emphasise that the focus of spending must lead to long lasting impact against the vision (above) that will live on well beyond the Primary PE and Sport Premium funding.

#### It is expected that schools will see an improvement against the following 5 key indicators:

- 1. The engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity kick-starting healthy active lifestyles
- 2. The profile of PE and sport being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement
- 3. Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport
- 4. Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils
- 5. Increased participation in competitive sport

More Bikeability success: Bikeability for foundation & Y6 children took place for 30 Foundation & 30 Y5 children. 100% of children in Y5 achieved their Bikeability Level 2. This is now the second year in a row that we have ever had a whole cohort achieving this level.  St Andrew's Primary most notable sporting competition achievement was competing in and winning an SEN inclusion football tournament at GOALS (now Harpers Football).  83% of children in the Y4 cohort met NC swimming requirements.
